
# Annual Report 2022-2023





# RESILIENCY, RECOVERY, RELATIONSHIPS

It's not until you're tested that you know what you're made of.

2022/23 started where 2021/22 left off: with uncertainty. Greater Victoria Harbour Authority (GVHA) was coming off the second challenging financial year due to COVID that saw revenues reduced by 60 per cent, mainly from the loss of cruise ship activity. This resulted in a net operating loss of \$1.45 million for 2021/22, with a total impact from the pandemic climbing to a loss of \$2.66 million for the last two fiscal years.

When the Canadian border reopened to tourism at the start of 2022/23, GVHA cautiously anticipated the resumption of operations at all of our properties.

The tourist season started slowly, with cruise ships averaging just 35 per cent of capacity, but by the height of the season, ships reached 90 per cent of capacity. 2022/23 was a record year for cruise in Victoria, welcoming 329 ships and 715,000 cruise visitors. In August 2022, GVHA celebrated the nine millionth cruise visitor to Victoria!

GVHA also saw 2,208 pleasure vessels moor across our four marinas and 100 non-cruise ships utilize our deepwater terminal at The Breakwater District.

The deepwater terminal continued to demonstrate its versatility and strategically well-positioned location to assist large vessels. In addition to cruise ships, the MS GSL Eleni, MV CSL Tecumseh and other large vessels came alongside.

Terminal upland property also proved their value to the community. In addition to hosting several first responder exercises, the IEOA Truck Light Convoy and CFAX Santa's Anonymous benefitted from available space at Ogden Point.

With cruise ships returning to Victoria and our marinas up and running, GVHA turned our attention to capital projects. A repair plan to Broughton Pier—home to Victoria's iconic Red Fish Blue Fish—was announced in September 2022, with an estimated repair cost of \$1 million. Due to supply chain challenges, the project was deferred to the fall/winter of 2023/24.

Shore power remained a priority, and we continued to pursue funding from the federal and provincial governments. In April 2023, the B.C. government announced a \$9 million funding contribution towards shore power. This contribution is funding schematic design development and initiating a BC Hydro Interconnection Study.

During the 2022/23 fiscal year, GVHA's board of directors continued to provide guidance and stability in anticipation of a change in leadership, forming a hiring committee to search for GVHA's new CEO.

The pandemic and new CEO hiring bookended a year of change. We began the fiscal year transitioning from pandemic to post-pandemic plans. At the end of the fiscal year, our CEO of almost eight years retired. Ian Robertson worked tirelessly to position GVHA as a leader in the community and relentlessly advocated for shore power. Thank you, Ian, for your leadership and contributions to GVHA's success.

The process to find a new CEO—spearheaded by the board of directors hiring committee and in collaboration with Boyden Canada—began early last fiscal year.

Robert Lewis-Manning was appointed GVHA's new CEO and began his tenure on March 22, 2023. Robert has over 20 years of executive-level leadership experience in the global marine transportation sector. He has established a reputation as an innovative thought leader committed to building diverse and high-performing teams.

During his time with the Chamber of Shipping, he was responsible for developing and implementing a new strategic direction, including expanding client base and revenue, prioritizing partnerships with First Nations communities, and facilitating substantial changes to vessel operations in Canadian waters. He also advocated and negotiated the first marine conservation agreement in Canada to protect endangered whales, securing the support of three federal departments.

2022/23 was a year of resiliency, recovery and relationships. A record number of cruise ships visited our shores. Commercial operators on our properties had a bountiful tourist season. We returned to almost a full staffing complement. And we welcomed a new CEO to guide us through the next years of strategic planning.




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# **ABOUT US**

GVHA is a not-for-profit organization located on the traditional and unceded lands of the Lekwungen People, known today as the Songhees Nation and Xwsepsum (Esquimalt) Nation. We are committed to the stewardship and sustainable growth of Victoria's dynamic working harbour. We own 110 acres of harbour land and seabed as fee simple, meaning we are a self-funded organization that proudly contributes to the municipal tax base.

Several high-profile community amenities are within our property portfolio, including the Breakwater, Inner Harbour lower causeway and customs dock at Raymur Point.












# GOVERNANCE & LEADERSHIP TEAM

#### **OUR COMMITMENT**

First Nations reconciliation is at the centre of our work, and we aim to advance truth and reconciliation by working in close partnership with the Songhees Nation and Xwsepsum (Esquimalt) Nation. The Nations are founders of GVHA and leaders on our board of directors. They help to steward the lands we manage, actively direct our way forward and contribute to creating a positive and sustainable organization.

In this report, you'll see information on how we engage with the Songhees Nation and Xwsepsum (Esquimalt) Nation in all business segments. We are committed to this work and the ongoing learning and unlearning process.

We thank our Songhees Nation and Xwsepsum (Esquimalt) Nation partners for their ongoing friendship over the last 21 years. It is an honour to work alongside the Lekwungen People.



#### SILVER CERTIFIED

GVHA is silver certified! The Canadian Council for Aboriginal Business acknowledges Progressive Aboriginal Relations Silver organizations for recognizing the value of working with Indigenous communities and showing outcomes that have made a difference, including investment in communities, people, employment programs and business partnerships.



60 feet of dock space at our Inner Harbour Marina is reserved for use by the Lekwungen People.



Protocol Corner on the lower causeway is reserved for use by the Lekwungen People and reflects the tradition of visiting Nations asking permission to come ashore.





# RECOVERY & REVITALIZATION 2022/23 was a year for GVHA to bounce back from two tough pandemic years. The 2022 cruise season was a record year for cruise. We welcomed 329 cruise.

The 2022 cruise season was a record year for cruise. We welcomed 329 cruise ships and 715,829 cruise visitors to Victoria, a one per cent increase in passenger arrivals over 2019. Occupancy levels started around 35 per cent in the early months and reached up to 90 per cent by the end of the season. Cruise business contributed more than \$143 million to the regional economy, creating or supporting 800 direct and 1,600 indirect jobs in Greater Victoria.



We welcomed the 9 millionth cruise visitor to Victoria.



Over 1.2 million people visited the Inner Harbour lower causeway, enjoying over 20 music and cultural events.



5 filming projects took place on our properties.



2,208 non-cruise vessels moored at our four marinas, sailing to Victoria from around the world. (This number does not include commercial, annual, winter moorage and seaplanes.)

#### **COMMERCIAL BUSINESS**


- For the first time, GVHA offered longer-term contracts to commercial customers, and we renewed Helijet's lease at Camel Point for 25 years, affording operational predictability.
- When the owner of Victoria Marine Fuels announced his pending retirement, GVHA weighed the opportunity to take over operations and decided to do just that. GVHA begins operating the Fuel Dock at Fisherman's Wharf on October 20, 2023.

#### SOUTH ISLAND INDIGENOUS BUSINESS DIRECTORY

- GVHA started the directory in 2019, and it gained interest in the community over the past year.
- GVHA then partnered with South Island Prosperity Partnership, the City of Victoria, the Greater Victoria Chamber of Commerce and the Capital Regional District to take the Indigenous Business Directory to the next level.
- The South Island Indigenous Business Directory website and logo was created by Animikii, a
  local Indigenous-owned company that builds custom software, web-applications and

- The website was launched in June 2023.

#### SALISH SEA INDUSTRIAL SERVICES (SSIS)

GVHA entered into an MOU with SSIS, a marine industrial services company owned by Xwsepsum (Esquimalt) Nation, Songhees Nation and Ralmax Group of Companies. The MOU establishes a relationship with SSIS for ongoing repair and maintenance work on GVHA properties.







#### INDIGENOUS PROCUREMENT

GVHA has two Indigenous procurement targets. We currently aim for a six per cent capital spend and a three per cent operational spend. In 2022/23, GVHA had a 41.7 per cent Indigenous procurement capital spend, largely from our relationship with SSIS, and a 1.2 per cent operational spend.

In 2022, GVHA worked with Salish Seas Industrial Services, Geo Services, Songhees Tours, Songhees Events and Catering, the Lekwungen dancers and the Xwsepsum (Esquimalt) singers and dancers.

#### FIRST NATIONS ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

GVHA First Nations Economic Development Committee oversees the First Nations Revenue Contribution Fund. The fund dedicates one per cent of GVHA's operational revenue to initiatives that further the cultural and economic interests of the Nations in the harbour.

#### **WHAT'S AHEAD?**

- In years to come, we anticipate larger ships carrying more passengers per ship, resulting in greater economic impact per shore visit.
- We are committed to a managed tourism strategy.
- A realization of the Ogden Point Integrated Plan: the world keeps evolving and this plan must match what the future will bring.
- Integrated plans for the Inner Harbour and Fisherman's Wharf to create a comprehensive vision for developing GVHA properties.
- A thriving ocean hub. What does that look like? Let's discover that together.
- A continued focus on climate resiliency for facilities and their impacts on the social and environmental needs of the community.

## **COMMITTED TO SUSTAINABILITY**

From ocean to air to land to people, GVHA is committed to doing what's right for the environment, the Lekwungen People and the community.



#### Pacific Northwest to Alaska Green Corridor

GVHA joined a coalition of Pacific Northwest and Alaskan ports, cruise brands and maritime industry partners to be a first mover in the world's first commitment to green cruise shipping focused on zero emission cruise shipping.





#### **Clean Marine**

Clean Marine BC is a voluntary environmental assessment program for marinas and harbour authorities offered by the Georgia Strait Alliance B.C. Based on 2018 accreditation, our marinas received the highest possible rating of five anchors, placing our marinas among a small group of environmentally leading facilities.



#### Seabin at Fisherman's Wharf

A collective fundraising effort from GVHA and commercial operators saw a Seabin installed at Fisherman's Wharf. The Seabin collects ocean debris and promotes healthy ocean habitats.

#### **Green Marine Certified**

Green Marine is the premier environmental certification program for North America's maritime industry. We currently have a ranking of 3.7 out of 5 by Green Marine, an increase over our previous 2018 score of 3.3 and one that places the deepwater port among the most environmentally sustainable ports in North America.



#### Sustainable events

Every vendor that holds an event on our properties is expected to implement green initiatives. We provide vendors with our Green Guide and beginning in 2024 we will implement sustainability minimums to protect the air, ocean and land.

#### GVHA hired our first sustainability manager in 2022





The shore power project for all operations at The Breakwater District has received initial funding of \$9 million from B.C.'s Ministry of Transportation. This contribution will fund the development of schematic designs and initiate a BC Hydro Interconnection Study. After completing this monumental and multi-year initiative, Pier B will have two shore power connections for shore power-ready vessels at the deepwater terminal.

As a corollary to shore power, GVHA is looking at a long-term electrification strategy to employ renewable energy technologies to foster energy savings and independence.



#### **PurpleAir monitors**

GVHA installed PM2.5 PurpleAir monitors—
recommended by B.C.'s Ministry of Environment
—at our deepwater terminal and Fisherman's
Wharf properties.

PurpleAir monitors measure dust, dirt, soot and smoke particles and pollutants from motorized vehicles or vessels. Air quality readings from PurpleAir monitors installed at our properties consistently report a score of 20 or less. This is ideal for outdoor recreational activity.



Look who's helping to reduce emissions! A few GVHA staff are dedicated bike commuters, while others have opted for electric scooters or public transit.

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Our compost and recycling stations at Fisherman's Wharf make it easy for visitors to participate in sustainability efforts, while commercial operators only use compostable cutlery and dishes.

What's on our land can end up in our water. GVHA uses cleaning supplies that are ocean-friendly, and our staff work hard to ensure that debris is promptly picked up and kept out of the ocean.

We are working with tourism partners and local organizations to identify a path towards manageable tourism that includes energy-friendly modes of land transportation, such as walking, e-bikes, pedicabs and rickshaws.

## **COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS**

Community relationships are at the heart of everything we do. And at the heart of where we do business is Lekwungen territory.

We feel good about our efforts to connect with the community and strengthen relationships with the Lekwungen People. From event activation to placemaking to community outreach, we offered multiple options for Greater Victoria residents to connect with GVHA and enjoy our public amenities.

#### **EVENTS AND ACTIVATION**

- A new events strategy was implemented that focused on supporting community events and encouraging event organizers to present meaningful opportunities for the Lekwungen People to share their culture.
- 20 events were held at our Inner Harbour lower causeway, Fisherman's Wharf and Ogden Point properties.
- The Signs of Lekwungen Walking and Cultural Canoe Tours returned to the Inner Harbour.









#### **INNER HARBOUR PLACEMAKING PROJECT**

GVHA secured funding from PacifiCan's Tourism Relief Fund for a significant Lekwungen Inner Harbour placemaking project to:


- Develop five new and updated Lekwungen placemaking initiatives in the Inner Harbour.
- Create a greater awareness of this area's current and historical importance to the Lekwungen People.

A working group including GVHA, Songhees Nation and Xwsepsum (Esquimalt) Nation representatives helped steer this project and lead a community engagement process. The following steps will include a call to artists and the commission of artwork.

#### **COMMUNITY LIAISON COMMITTEE (CLC)**

The Community Liaison Committee engages with local business leaders, community leaders and community members on issues brought forward by any member, resulting in solutions-focused outcomes and timelines.

The CLC meets every two months, and sub-committees (Transportation, Community Engagement, Visitor Economy) work together to make recommendations or look into concerns from the community. Members provide feedback for GVHA to consider in response to issues brought forward.















# TALENT ENGAGEMENT

It's no secret: people make the place. When staff feel valued and included, it creates an environment where people can flourish and customers receive exceptional service.

Creating that environment takes time, and GVHA recognizes that to get there we need to commit to equity, diversity and inclusion (EDI) in the workplace.

#### **OPPORTUNITES FOR STAFF TO PRACTICE CULTURE**

- GVHA adopted Canada Labour Code's Aboriginal Cultural Leave policy, ensuring that Indigenous employees can take a leave of up to five days a year to practice culture.
- Any employee can request a substitution of a statutory holiday for another holiday to celebrate days of significance that are relevant to them.

#### COMMITTED TO LEARNING THE STORY OF THE LEKWUNGEN PEOPLE

 The Signs of Lekwungen Walking Tour is now a formal part of GVHA's board of directors onboarding process.

#### INDIGENOUS DOCK CREW PROGRAM

 Two Indigenous participants who worked at GVHA for one month to learn about the role and responsibilities of working at the Inner Harbour marina came on board as seasonal full-time staff for 2022.

#### LEKWUNGEN YOUTH JOB SHADOWING PROGRAM

- GVHA, Eagle Wing Tours, Destination Greater Victoria and Prince of Whales hosted the third annual Marine Tourism Job Shadowing Program.
- Five youth participated in the program and two of those participants now work with Destination Greater Victoria and Prince of Whales.
- An equal opportunity employer, GVHA attended job fairs, including the Songhees Job Fair, the T'Sou-ke Nation Job Fair and UVIC Indigenous Career Fair.






## **INNOVATION & CARE**

The pandemic tested GVHA's resiliency while prompting us to look ahead to better days. With eyes to the future, GVHA focused on reducing deferred maintenance work and ensuring the most efficient use of capital funds.

Major capital works are continuing, with significant repairs to Broughton Pier scheduled for completion in early 2024. Additionally, GVHA is embarking on a multi-year scour and pier face repair program, estimated at approximately \$1.7 Million in repairs over three years.

Facility conditions assessments completed in 2021 continue to be used to prioritize planning and reduce deferred maintenance works. The infrastructure team is evaluating and updating its project and capital delivery approach to ensure the most efficient use of limited capital funds and efficiencies in decision-making. This effort includes preparing a series of resilience plans, starting with The Breakwater District, for addressing climate change impacts on current facilities. The outcome of this plan is to allow GVHA to coordinate its scheduled infrastructure works with best practice methods and technologies for reducing infrastructure vulnerabilities to the properties.



## FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The focus for this year was "back to basics" as we resumed cruise and rebuilt the organization after two difficult fiscal years. After a slow start to the season, GVHA experienced record revenues, and all areas of the organization saw revenue increases. With these revenue increases and careful expense management, GVHA saw an EBITDA result of \$5.4 million.

GVHA received funding from three government programs this year: Environment and Climate Change Canada for the schematics for shore Power (\$100,000), PacifiCan from the Tourism Relief Fund for the rehabilitation of Broughton Pier (\$500,000) and the Lekwungen Placemaking initiative (\$49,000) and the provincial government contributed \$9 million to assist with the BC Hydro portion of the Shore Power project.

Capital spending of \$300,000 for this fiscal included the start of the Broughton Pier project and the completion of schematics for the Shore Power project. All cash generated by GVHA operations is reinvested into our facilities through capital spending and our repairs and maintenance program.

# **RISK MANAGEMENT**

GVHA's Enterprise Risk Management (ERM) program manages the risks inherent to marine-related business.

ERM is the process of planning, organizing, leading and controlling the activities of an organization to minimize the effects of risk on the organization. Our ERM program employs the internationally recognized principles of ISO 31000. The ERM Risk Register is updated by management and reviewed quarterly with the board of directors.

## **GOVERNANCE**

The board of directors comprises 13 individuals who provide governance and strategic oversight for the Greater Victoria Harbour Authority. The board of directors approves the organisation's strategic plan, business plan and annual budget. In addition, this group is responsible for the oversight, compensation and evaluation of the chief executive officer's performance.

The board is also directly accountable to the organization's eight member agencies with broad representation of the Capital Region. These member agencies are comprised of GVHA's founding members. These member agencies nominate nine directors, and four independent directors are selected through a nominations task force that examines nominees' skills and experience.

Each member agency also appoints a member representative to act on its behalf in maintaining a direct relationship with our organization throughout the year. Member representatives also represent their member agencies with voting rights at our annual general meeting.

Each director serves a term of up to four years and may serve two additional consecutive terms of up to four years, subject to board approval. The appointment terms run on a calendar year ending December 31.
